International AIDS Summit for London

March 7–10, 1988, London

London (LPS): The London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, which operates the world's first international database solely devoted to AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) is planning a major international conference to look at the social and economic impact of the disease on a global scale.

More than 1000 delegates from the medical profession and other organizations are expected to attend the three-day meeting between 7 and 10 March next year (1988) which the school has initiated in association

with the World Health Organization, the Commonwealth Secretariat and Britain's Department of Health.

Mr. David FitzSimmons, director of the Bureau of Hygiene and Tropical Diseases at the school, which also runs the AIDS database, said the conference was not aimed solely at those engaged in medical research but would be discussing the wider social, demographic, and economic problems of AIDS. It was expected to attract employers, community workers, and those engaged in tourism and the travel business.

Professor Patrick Hamilton, who heads the Department of Community Medicine at the school, pointed out that AIDS would in future not only affect health care systems but also national and personal finances, employment and industry, and Third World development.

The meeting entitled "The Global Impact of AIDS" will be held at London's Barbican Centre and leading speakers are expected to include Dr. Robert Gallo from the United States and Professor Luc Montaigner of France.

Electronic "clearing house"

Mr. FitzSimmons said that the AIDS database established by the Bureau could be accessed through library terminals and from desk top micros through three major networks Datastar (mainly Europe), BRS (United States), and CAB (international). It acted as a clearing house for information on AIDS, containing abstracts of material which had been published on the disease.

"In the first month of operation in June 1986 we were interrogated by 291 people in the United States. We are always pleased to receive information on AIDS", he said.
