#### Q 1 Please summarize the main findings of the study.

Eritrean women had a lower rate of primary C-sections and a higher likelihood of emergency C-sections. increased risk for Eritrean women ending in emergency C-section due to language barriers and gestational diabetes rather than Eritrean nationality.

Eritrean women in Switzerland were notably less likely to use any form of analgesia healthcare professionals in Swiss labor wards have the necessary time, linguistic capabilities, an cultural competences to effectively understand a woman's perception of labor pain, inform on misconceptions about analgesia, and to offer appropriate pain management that aligns to patientsinformed wishes.

- 3. In Brazil, the CS rate was 55.9% in 2018, 70% in private health sector (supplementary health), Chinese studies have estimated that 24.6%-28.4% of CS cases were performed on maternal request without any medical indication, CS rates 15.5% in Iceland to 56% in Chile...


