Q 1 Please summarize the main theme of the review.

The review has looked into the policies on NCDs in Africa, including the equity aspect, coverage of NCD areas, and some aspects of the implementation of policies. The review has brought out the many deficiencies in mounting a comprehensive response to the rising burden of NCDs.

Q 2 Please highlight the limitations and strengths.

Strengths- good to see the study from Africa using papers published from Africa. Such capacity is critical to advance the policy response. The authors have done the systematic review well and identified the main limitations.

Limitations- interpretation has gone beyond what was identified from the review. Mainly tobacco policies were in the final set of papers reviewed. Socio-cultural and economic context has a major bearing and needs more mention. There are many resources in WHO such as the https://extranet.who.int/ncdccs/documents/repository of NCD policies.

Q 3 Please provide your detailed review report to the authors, structured in major and minor comments.

Major comments:

- 1. This is an important topic and very relevant for policy development in Africa.
- 2. Use of studies from Africa is a plus point and also helps to promote more studies in this area which is critical.
- 3. Scope can be indicated in a clear manner as there are multiple areas. Terminologies are important in terms of prevention, management of manifest diseases versus reducing the possibility of risk exposure by taxation, health system capacity, and UHC which is a slightly different but related area, the health of migrants and people in emergencies also need a slightly different take.
- 4. At present all these are mentioned in the inference and maybe better articulated.
- 5. Additional sources such as the NCD country cpaacity surveys from WHO, NCD document repsoitory which has policies from countries and NCD data such as the STEPS surveys can be added.
